Shark Tank/Ameritowne

Grades: 4-5

Course Description: Have you ever watched Shark Tank and thought it looked fun? If so, this is the class for you! We will begin the year learning about free enterprise and what it means to be an entrepreneur. Then, we will move into our Shark Tank projects and go through the steps of development necessary to "pitch" ideas to our team of sharks (investors). This will require some time and help outside of class to prepare the products you decide to use in your presentation. It may also require that necessary materials are purchased outside of class as well.

Ameritowne is a financial literacy class and will begin later in the first semester and continue into the second semester. We will cover economics, banking, money management, advertising, ethics, and philanthropy. Everything that we will learn in class will help us to prepare for our field trip to Ameritowne (which is in Lakewood). Students will each have a job in town and will be responsible citizens in charge of running the town for a day. There is no homework for this portion of class, but it does require a field trip in the later Spring of 2025 (actual date to be determined). The field trip will be scheduled outside of our regular school schedule and additional fees may apply.

Secondary Class Descriptions

Art of Letters

Grades: 6-8

Using both handwritten and digital letter forms, the class will cover a variety of topics—everything from improving penmanship and developing a personal cursive signature to reviewing grammar rules and improving paragraph development. Students will experiment with different styles and purposes in their writing, trying out forms like friendly letters, letters of complaint, letters to the editor, apology letters, and more. Students will have the opportunity to send and receive their letters—to astronauts, to the local newspaper, to a pen pal, to businesses and colleges, and more!

American Sign Language 1

Instructor: Mrs. Jeanine Roybal

Grade: 6-12

Course Description: It is time to turn off your voice and open your eyes to the beauty of American Sign Language (ASL) and Deaf culture. Students will acquire a basic proficiency in American Sign Language (ASL) using a comprehensive, systematic approach. Learning over 500 vocabulary words along with Deaf Culture and History. This course will require significant study and practice outside of class. Our time together will be spent learning new material through playing games, videos, hand-outs and conversing with the language. This class is meant to be immersive, meaning, there will be as little as possible "voicing" in this class.

Prerequisite: Read/write English at or above grade level. Commitment to minimal "voicing" during class and a Personal Commitment to use the language outside of the classroom. No prior ASL knowledge necessary.

Homework Level: 1-3

Supplies: Pencil, 3x5 index cards on a ring, a one subject notebook and binder, a mirror, access to a computer/tablet for online dictionary and videos.

Clay

Instructor: Ms. Ashley Reid

Grades: 6th-12th

Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the wonderful world of clay! In this fun and relaxed class students will learn the beginning techniques of clay manipulation including pinch and coil methods, slab building, modeling, and surface and glaze application. There will be a mix of assigned and student-choice projects to allow for the creative process of the student. **This course may be taken multiple times!** Experienced Students will have more freedom to work on projects of their choosing and can have the opportunity to learn advanced techniques.

Prerequisites: none

Homework: 0

Supplies: long Apron recommended, sketch book (can be inexpensive, any size and even partially used), basic clay supply kit (with at least all the tools included in this kit Amazon.com: SE 8-Piece Pottery Tool Set - 4PT8), small tub or container to store clay tools.

Court Cases in the US, historically through the present

Instructor: Mr. Jim Rittenhouse

Grades: 9-12

Course Description: The course is designed as a study of, primarily, Supreme Court cases. Students will read and discuss summaries of cases and relate key issues in each case to Constitutional law. Students will be encouraged to gain an appreciation for law, as well as for the process of making law as it relates to the idea of Justice (as expressed in the Preamble to the Constitution). The class strives to enhance critical thinking skills and the questioning of ideas.

Prerequisites: Basic knowledge of US Government is helpful but not required

Homework: 0 There is no homework associated with the class.

Supplies: Spiral notebook (note taking is essential); folder with two pockets, pens/pencils.

Other: We will not cover the same cases as last year. Students must be able to read, research and write at or above grade level. Every assignment is valued at a certain number of points; grades are based on points earned/point possible. Graded work includes short weekly review quizzes, written work (completed in class), and scored discussions.

Creative Writing

Instructor: Mrs. Leigh Moore

Grades: 9-12

Course Description: This class will help students find their creative voices. Students will workshop their creative ideas in a variety of genres: poetry, short stories, drama, and narrative non-fiction. Students will learn essential literary elements and develop skills that can be used in any writing task: clarity, description, transition, and revision. Ultimately, the class will publish a literary journal at the end of the year, a compilation of the best work from the class.

Prerequisites: None

Homework: 1

Supplies: Folder, notebook paper, pen or pencils. Access to a computer with a word processing program (e.g. Microsoft Word, Pages, or Google Docs) and the ability to print and/or email their work.

Other: This is a repeatable class!

Current Events

Instructor: Mr. Jim Rittenhouse

Grades: 9-12

Course Description: The class will be spent reading, discussing, and writing about articles from current news events.

Prerequisites: Read/write at or above grade level.

Homework: 1 Bring articles as assigned.

Supplies: Spiral notebook (note taking is essential); folder with two pockets, pens/pencils. Access to news sources (on-line, newspapers, magazine, short journal articles)

Other: Students should be able to read and write at grade level. Grades will be based on map quizzes, short written assignments, discussion, occasional content quizzes, bringing articles.

Dabbling in Design

Course Description:

Homework Level: 0-1

Middle School Literature: Heroes, Outsiders & Survivors

Grades: 6-8

Course Description: Have you ever wanted to be a hero? Felt like an outsider? Been inspired by a survival story? If you answered yes to any of the above, this class is for you! Grades: 6-12

Outdoor Survival Skills

Grade: 6 – 12

Course Description: In this class you will make your own field guide for survival situations. The focus will be on survival awareness, foraging, shelter building, fire crafting, animal situations, and personal ingenuity.

US History/Geography I

Prerequisites: Read/write at or above grade level.

Homework: 2-4 Weekly study, reading and writing assignments, content and map quizzes.

Supplies: Spiral notebook (note taking is essential); folder with two pockets.

Other: The school provides textbooks for the class. Primary source materials will be used (the text of the Mayflower Contract for example) to supplement the textbook. Students will occasionally be given assignments dealing with modern applications of issues discussed in class. Students. Extra credit is available as described in the class.

US History/Geography II

Grades: 6-9

Course Description: This is the second of three courses designed to break the study of US History into three time periods, studied over the course of three years of school. This course deals with the span of time from the Revolution to the Antebellum period. The study will

revolve around causes and effects of actions of individuals and nations during this time. Time in class is spent covering what happened, but emphasis is on asking questions: why things happened, what were the results and future implication; discussion will be encouraged. Study skills, writing skills and logical argumentation will also be stressed as part of the course.

Prerequisites: Read/write at or above grade level. It isn't necessary to have taken American History/Geography I before taking this class, but it is helpful.

Homework: 2-4 Weekly study, reading and writing assignments, content and map quizzes.

Supplies: Spiral notebook (note taking is essential); folder with two pockets.

Other: The school provides textbooks for the class. Primary source materials will be used (the Dred Scott Supreme Court decision, the Emancipation Proclamation, the Constitution for example) to supplement the textbook. Students will occasionally be given assignments dealing with modern applications of issues discussed in class. Extra credit is available as described in the class.

World History/Geography I

Instructor: Mr. Jim Rittenhouse

Grades: 8-12

Course Description: This course covers the period of time from Prehistory to the European Renaissance. The study will revolve around causes and effects of actions of individuals and nations during this time. Colorado state standards will be addressed, and grades will be based on quizzes, essays, homework assignments, short writing assignments, scored discussions, map quizzes and group work. Primary source materials will be used (excerpts from Hammurabi's Code for example) to supplement the district's text.

Prerequisites: Students should be reading and writing at or above grade level to enroll in this class.

Homework: 2-4 Weekly study, reading and writing assignments, content and map quizzes.

Supplies: Spiral notebook (note taking is essential); folder with two pockets.

Other: Students will occasionally be given assignments dealing with modern applications of issues discussed in class. Students will be encouraged to engage in classroom discussion. Study skills, writing skills and logical argumentation will also be stressed as part of the course. Extra credit is available as described in the class.
